RE: SECOND READING of Temp. Ord. No. 1717, Creating the Miramar Sister

Cities Board

RECOMMENDATION: The City Manager recommends approval of Temp. Ord. No. 1717, establishing the Miramar Sister Cities Board.

ISSUE: City Commission approval is required to establish the Miramar Sister Cities Board.

BACKGROUND: On January 16, 2019, the City Commission approved Temporary Ordinance No. 1717 on first reading. Based on Resolution 17-197, which approved on August 23, 2017, the Miramar Sister Cities Exploration Committee was formed. It met six times over a year. After overview, insight and guidance was given on Sister Cities International, the Committee researched and discussed items for establishing and maintaining a viable Sister Cities Program. Attachment "1" contains a summary of the Committee's findings.

Over the course of these meetings, the structure, focus, and potential Sister Cities program were discussed. Along the way, a profile, model and by-laws were created. At the end of this process, the Committee concluded with comprehensive recommendations and findings to create a Miramar Sister Cities Board.

<u>DISCUSSION:</u> Chapter 2 of the City Code allows for the creation of various boards, committees, and commissions. This ordinance allows for the creation of the Miramar

Sister Cities Board, which will make recommendations to the City Commission on the Sister Cities Program to build mutually beneficial relationships by facilitating economic, cultural and educational exchanges between Miramar and its international Sister Cities

ANALYSIS: Creation of a Sister Cities Board is the next step in the process of establishing a Sister Cities program.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF MIRAMAR, FLORIDA, AMENDING SECTION 2-51(A) OF THE CITY CODE TO ADD THE MIRAMAR SISTER CITIES BOARD; AMENDING ARTICLE III "BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS," OF CHAPTER 2 "ADMINISTRATION" OF THE CITY CODE, CREATING DIVISION 8 "MIRAMAR SISTER CITIES BOARD" TO CREATE THE MIRAMAR SISTER CITIES BOARD; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, to facilitate and maintain world peace, cities, their elected officials, and their citizens need to collaborate internationally; and

WHEREAS, these relationships include facilitating economic, cultural and educational exchanges based on respect and goodwill that are mutually beneficially to each community; and

WHEREAS, the City Commission desires to formalize relationships with international cities; and

WHEREAS, to that end, the City Commission finds it in the best interest of the City and its residents to create the Miramar Sister Cities Board, to analyze issues affecting sister city relationships and make recommendations to formalize these relationships.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF MIRAMAR, FLORIDA AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1:</u> That the foregoing "WHEREAS" clauses are ratified and confirmed as being true and correct and are made a specific part of this Ordinance.

Section 2: That Section 2-51(a) of the City Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

Chapter 2 – ADMINISTRATION

* * *

ARTICLE III. – BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS

DIVISION 1. – GENERALLY

Sec. 2-51 – Attendance of certain board members at meetings required

(a) Applicability. Attendance requirements are hereby established for board members. As used in this section, the word "board" shall refer to the advisory zoning board, the advisory planning board, the civil service board, parks and recreation advisory board, the safety council, and the Blasting Citizen Advisory Committee, and the Miramar Sister Cities Board.

<u>Section 3:</u> That Chapter 2 "Administration," Article III, "Boards, Committees and Commissions" of the City Code is hereby amended to create Section <u>2-105.10</u> the "Miramar Sister Cities Board," which shall read as follows:

* * *

Section 2-105.10 - Miramar Sister Cities Board

- (a) Creation and Purpose. There is hereby established the Miramar Sister Cities Board, to build mutually beneficial relationships between Miramar and its international Sister Cities, and to make recommendations to the City Commission concerning said cities.
- (b) Composition, appointment of directors, terms of office.
 - (1) To be eligible for membership, one must be a resident or an employee of a business located in the City of Miramar, a U.S. citizen and a registered voter. City residency shall not be required, but each member shall demonstrate a particular interest in the city's quality of life, such as economic/business development; culture; education; sports/recreation; entertainment; tourism.
 - (2) The Miramar Sister Cities Board (and its membership) shall include seven directors as follows:
 - a. Five directors are appointed, each by a member of the City Commission.
 - One local business representative, whose place of business is within the City. This appointee will be selected by majority vote of the City Commission.
 - c. One local educational institution representative, whose institution is within the City. This appointee will be selected by majority vote of the City Commission.
 - (3) A City staff member to serve as staff liaison.

- (4) Directors shall be selected from a pool of applicants. Applications shall be submitted to the City Clerk's office.
- (5) The terms of office of the directors shall be up to four years, with each member serving until his or her successor is appointed; maximum service is two consecutive terms.
- (6) Appointments to fill any vacancy on the Miramar Sister Cities Board shall be for the remainder of the unexpired term.
- (c) Officers; quorum; rules of procedures; public records; Sunshine Law.
 - (1) The Miramar Sister Cities Board shall elect a <u>chair</u>, <u>vice-chair</u>, <u>president</u>, <u>vice-president</u>, <u>secretary</u>, <u>and</u> treasurer. <u>and three other non-officer directors</u>. Officers shall be elected by a majority vote of the directors at its first meeting after the members' initial appointments, and every two years thereafter.
 - (2) Sections 2-51, 2-52 and 2-65 of City Code, shall be applicable to the Miramar Sister Cities Board.
 - (3) All meetings, records and files of the Miramar Sister Cities Board shall be open and available to the public, consistent with F.S. Ch. 119, (the Public Records Law), and F.S. Ch. 286, (the Sunshine Law).
- (d) Duties and responsibilities.
 - (1) The Miramar Sister Cities Board shall meet monthly or as often as it determines is appropriate to perform its functions.
 - (2) Analyze issues which will lead to develop long-term international municipal relationships working in collaboration to achieve mutually beneficial economic, cultural and educational exchanges, then make recommendations to the Commission on the Sister Cities Program for approval.

(3) Other functions will include long-range planning through policy development, financial management of the program and evaluation of the activities.

<u>Section 4:</u> That all sections or parts of sections of the City Code, all ordinances or parts of ordinances and all resolutions or parts of resolutions in conflict herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

<u>Section 5</u>: That should any section or provision of this ordinance, or any paragraph, section or word be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remainder hereof, as a whole or part hereof, other than the part declared to be invalid.

<u>Section 6</u>: That it is the intention of the City Commission that the provisions of this ordinance shall become and be made part of the Code of the City of Miramar, and that the sections of this ordinance may be re-numbered or re-lettered and the word "Ordinance" may be changed to "Chapter", "Section", "Article" or such other appropriate word or phrase, the use of which shall accomplish the intentions herein expressed.

<u>Section 7</u>: That this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption on second reading.

On August 23, 2017, Temporary Resolution #R6524 was approved by the Miramar City Commission directing Staff to establish a Sister Cities Program. To that end, a Miramar Sister Cities (MSC) Exploration Committee was formed. It was done under the leadership of the Community & Economic Development Department.

Jamaica

Montego Bay 96,488

- second largest city in Jamaica after Kingston
- tourist destination featuring duty-free shopping, a cruise line terminal
- the city holds most of the weight of the country's tourism sector
- most of the country's visitors arrive and depart from Montego Bay's Airport or Port
- many international companies have resorts in the city
